The University of Nebraska Public Policy Center (NUPPC) is collaborating on several suicide prevention efforts across the state, including programs on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus. In collaboration with campus partners at **UNL** 



### **Counseling and Psychological**

**Services** and **Campus Recreation**, NUPPC developed a new training program to help students and staff recognize signs of suicide risk and respond effectively. During the 2024–25 school year, over 500 participants completed the training, reporting increased confidence and knowledge in supporting those at risk. **Learn more at caps.unl.edu/prevent-suicide**.

As part of a co-operative agreement with the CDC, NUPPC also launched a statewide suicide prevention media campaign, particularly focused on men ages 25–64, whose rate is nearly twice that of other Nebraskans. Working with state and local organizations, NUPPC is enhancing community-based efforts through gatekeeper training, promoting safe storage of lethal means, highlighting tele-behavioral health access, and supporting suicide loss survivors. **Learn more at Nebraska Suicide Prevention**.


