
**Key Findings of 2022 Lincoln Vital Signs Report Show Lincoln is Thriving in Many Areas but Challenges Persist** 



The Lincoln Journal Star and Nebraska Today highlight key findings of the 2022 Lincoln Vital Signs report, which was published in June 2022 at **LincolnVitalSigns.org**. Results point to the areas in which Lincoln is doing well as a community (decreased homelessness and food insecurity, low crime rates), persistent concerns (inequities in areas such as graduation rates and employment), and overall population shifts (increasing ethnic/racial diversity, aging population). The report has become the centerpiece of a community-wide engagement process to set priorities and take action to make Lincoln even stronger.


### Multiple Pathways of Recovery and Building Equity

**Center Staff Travel to Texas to Assist U.S. Army Research Institute with Data Collection and Analysis** 

The PPC has a three-year cooperative agreement with the U.S. Army Research Institute (ARI) to identify factors impacting the development of leadership identity in enlisted Army personnel. **Dr. Mario Scalora** and **Dr. Denise Bulling** are working with **Dr. L.J. McElravy**, associate dean of graduate studies and associate professor in the Department of Agricultural Leadership, Education, and Communication at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. This month, the team traveled to Texas to conduct surveys and interviews to gather data for further analysis. During the later phases, they will develop case studies and a training package for the ARI and the Department of Defense.

# Governor Declares September Suicide Prevention Month and Preparedness Month in Nebraska
